

Monthly Musings from Rev. Melissa Carvill-Ziemer

If you were in church this past month you probably noticed some changes to our order of service. Over the summer the Worship Arts Team and I decided to experiment with using printed Caring Cards for sharing joys and sorrows, concerns and milestones. People who have something to share are invited to write on these cards for the worship leader to read, rather than speaking aloud themselves during the Embracing Meditation. The primary reason for this experiment was that the spoken time in our service was not inclusive of people who need amplification in order to hear. I know that there is some loss in this change. Some people prefer having the opportunity to speak aloud themselves for the catharsis that comes of speech and others have shared that they don't necessarily know that they have something to share until they are in the moment of meditation. I appreciate both of these points. However, I have heard from many more

people who have been grateful that they now can hear all that is being shared. I've also heard from some introverts who were not comfortable speaking themselves but appreciate the opportunity to share in written form. The Worship Arts Team will review this experiment when we meet again later this fall, but so far it seems to me that we have made real strides in inclusion and accessibility with this new approach.

We hadn't intended to make other changes to the order of worship this fall, but one of the advantages of having an Interim Director of Religious Education is the opportunity revisit how and why we do things the way we do. Karen LoBracco brought to our attention that the time our children and youth are in the sanctuary with adults seemed to be creeping from the intended 15 minutes to 20 or 25 minutes on a regular basis. As we considered this observation

and reviewed the order of service prior to the Time for All Ages, we realized that announcements are a variable that is difficult to control. We also quickly concluded that announcements are not a central part of faith development in the way that hearing and singing music, reading a Unitarian Universalist covenant, the Time for All Ages and the planned religious education classes are. Therefore, we are also experimenting with moving the announcements to another place in the order of service. While we are at it, we are also experimenting with moving the "greet your neighbor" portion of the service as well. We tried a few different combinations in October and will try a few more in November. The Worship Arts Team will review these experiments too and I'd like to include your feedback, so please let me know if you have a strong opinion about what you think has or has not worked well.

Finally, I'd like to encourage us all to use our print communications including this newsletter, the Thread from the Web and the enUUs for sharing (and reading!) announcements. The good news about a healthy, dynamic congregation is that there is always a lot going on. Our challenge is to figure out ways of communicating all that goodness! It is tempting to consider a verbal announcement during the worship services for all of our events, but I'd suggest that we try to reserve verbal announcements for events that are directed toward the congregation as a whole. Alternatively we could start the services 10 minutes early and have an open announcement time for sharing community news. Or we could aim to keep announcements the length of a tweet. Announcements are a chance for us to invite engagement and showcase the vitality of our congregation. But lots of church expert types say they don't really work? Tell me what you think. I'm still mulling this one over.








Into the Beautiful North
