

## Monthly Musings from Rev. Melissa Carvill-Ziemer

One of my greatest pleasures in parenting is watching the emergence of imagination. Right now my two and half year old child is at the place in which he believes he can create everything he can imagine. As far as he's concerned, once you imagine it, all you have to do is say it and it will be so. Therefore he spends his days becoming a great number of animals. One minute he is a grizzly bear, the next he's a painted turtle and turn around again and he will be a blunt-nosed dolphin. When he isn't busy being an animal, he's likely to be one of a cast of characters from his books or Sesame Street. When he paints or colors he narrates complex compositions as he works – today's painting involved an ox named Starsky, a shepherd, several mice and a mountain lion. And he's never met an instrument he cannot play. This morning he played drums, harmonica and a tambourine in a marching band. For now his creations are limited only by the limits of his imagination.

Part of growing up must involve learning what is and isn't possible. But I wish for him and for all children that it does not involve learning that only professionals can create. I don't know when it happens or how, but I know that so many adults believe that some people have creative talent and others do not. I don't think that is true. Imagination is a gift of our birth. And as long as we can imagine, we can create. The only real question is how.

This month our worship theme is creation. As the earth is bursting forth with new life and the colors of spring, it is a good time for personal reflection. How are you tending the creative spirit in your life? I look forward to seeing you in church.

## Policy Update

The UUCK Board has been working hard behind the scenes to ensure that our church runs smoothly and will continue to do so. To that end, a new Conflict of Interest (COI) policy has been adopted which covers all church employees, trustees, and committee members with financial decision making responsibilities. Essentially, any individual who has an outside/non-church interest in business the church is conducting must disclose that interest and let someone else make the decisions. For example, if I'm on the church committee hiring a landscaper, I have a conflict of interest if my landscaping company submits a bid for the job. I would need to inform the committee chair or Ministerial Executive Team of the conflict and follow the COI policy. The complete policy can be found by contacting the church office.

## Policy Update

The church board has recently approved a new policy governing social justice events sponsored by the church. The policy addresses what people should do to organize an action or an educational activity. For example, the policy says the following about educational events sponsored by the church:

"Task forces or groups at the church may organize educational events on any issue. Presenters at educational events sponsored by the church represent themselves and do not represent the position of the church on an issue. Organizers of educational events should make this clear at the event. If the church has passed a resolution on the issue being discussed, organizers of the educational event may announce this. Educational events at the church on social justice issues should be open to all viewpoints, and people with different views than those of the presenters should be given the opportunity to express their views respectfully

Groups that organize educational events will inform the Social Justice Coordinator of the planned event prior to the event and will agree to adhere to the church policy on educational events."

## Making Sense of the Middle East Crisis

On Tuesday, April 12 at 7pm, Kent State University Political Science Professor Steven Hook will give a talk at the church titled "*Making Sense of the Middle East Crisis.*" Professor Hook will address the roots of the upheavals in the Middle East during the past several years. Participants will discuss President Obama's response to the crisis and possible actions in the future.



Move to Amend national spokesperson David Cobb will speak on "Creating Democracy and Challenging Corporate Rule," Tuesday, April 5, at 7:00 pm at the Unitarian Universalist Church of Kent. His presentation is both history lesson

and heartfelt call-to-action. David will discuss the American creation myth and the Constitution regarding Corporate Personhood and illegitimate-but-legal corporate constitutional rights. Attendees can learn how to get involved in the campaign to end corporate personhood and demand real democracy.

Move to Amend is seeking a constitutional amendment stating that corporations are not people, and that money is not speech. Last November, the City of Kent overwhelmingly passed a charter amendment in support of such a constitutional amendment. For more details, contact Lee Brooker.



## Capital Campaign Notes

Earn a lot more interest on your money and help with our new Fellowship Hall construction at the same time!

Later this year, as we complete construction on our wonderful new Fellowship Hall, we will need to pay our general contractor in full. Our capital campaign pledges are payable over three years to 2018.... so we need to finance that gap.

This is where you, the congregation can help keep the construction moving and help your self at the same time. We have added two additional lending levels to allow more congregants to participate. Here are three levels at which you can help.

- Buy a Chalice Bond for \$4,787.00 on July 1, 2016 and receive a payback of \$5,000 on December 31, 2018 – an interest rate of 1.75%
- Buy a Chalice Bond for \$9,573.00 on July 1, 2016 and receive a payback of \$10,000 on December 31, 2018 - an interest rate of 1.75%
- Construction Notes - lend a minimum of \$20,000 at a rate of 2.50%, and receive a quarterly interest check, with a payback of principal on December 31, 2018.

Check out the current rate on your savings account and you'll see that this is a great rate. It's also by far the most cost effective rate to finance construction now while we collect our pledges over the next three years.

While these notes are unsecured, the amount borrowed from congregants will not exceed the total amount of money that we expect to collect in capital campaign pledges. Your loan will be paid back in full by December of 2018 as we collect our capital campaign donations over the next three years.




## Being Mortal

The Patricia Pownall UU Book Group will be meeting on a different day in April. We will be meeting on Thursday, April 14 at 7 pm in Founder's Lounge at church. Please bring a small snack to share and bring your own beverage.

This month we are reading *Being Mortal* by Atul Gawande. In *Being Mortal*, the author tackles the hardest challenge of his profession: how medicine can not only improve life but also the process of its ending. Gawande, a practicing surgeon, addresses his profession's ultimate limitation, arguing that quality of life is the desired goal for patients and families. He offers examples of freer, more socially fulfilling models for assisting the infirm and dependent elderly, and he explores the varieties of hospice care to demonstrate that a person's last weeks or months may be rich and dignified. Full of eye-opening research and riveting storytelling, *Being Mortal* asserts that medicine can comfort and enhance our experience even to the end, providing not only a good life but also a good end.
