"If you go online to sites like Instagram or Twitter and search for the hashtag "blessed" (hashtag is sort of like adding a keyword to something), [you'll see] people, especially celebrities, will post something that is essentially bragging and add #blessed to attempt to make the post sound humble. Celebrity photos of the red carpet, huge diamond rings, champagne, and extravagant travel, all are apparently signs that the recipient is #blessed.

Lots of people use the hashtag in a mocking or ironic way, like the person who tweeted: Caught a piece of bacon falling out of my sandwich right before it hit the ground.

It's funny, but all these #blessed blessings suck all the real energy and power from the concept of feeling blessed—of soul-deep gratitude. Real honest gratitude is never smug or braggy. A blessing is richer than wealth and tastier than bacon.

Additionally, those social media posts on Instagram and Twitter only show a self-curated image. #blessed is a manic, 'Jazz hands!' kind of happiness. Everyone is smiling and has great hair. A #blessed life apparently never includes pain or loss, or even mild discord or inconvenience.

But of course we know that kind of life is impossible. I think a truly blessed life comes from:living with integrity; loving your work, most of the time; loving the people around you, most of the time; and loving yourself, most of the time."

So this month let's right the ship! Let's together honor those blessings that are richer than wealth and tastier than bacon, and that are true gifts, most of the time. Here are three options to participate in this communal spiritual exercise:

- If you are on Twitter: tweet moments of true blessing using the hashtag #soulblessings.
- If you do Instagram: post pictures of the #soulblessings you see in the world around you (and be sure to tag your picture).
- If you use Facebook (yes, hashtags work on Facebook too!), you're invited to post pictures or tell a story of #soulblessings both on your own personal page as well as on our group Soul Matters Facebook page.

Do it throughout the month, even daily if that feels like a good discipline for you. The point is for us to experience #soulblessings together.


May Flora and Fauna from Karen LoBracco

Our Whole Lives Facilitator Training



to raising \$2500 this year.



Moderator's Musings

A celebration is in order.... and we will have one soon! On April 18th and 19th, members of the Building Extension Team. Board



Appeals and Planning Commission meetings to present the plans for our new Hobbs Fellowship Hall and classroon/library building. These evenings were important markers in our journey towards expansion and growth.

On Monday, the 18th, Board of Zoning Appeals members expressed concerns about setbacks and amount of green space on our site. They shared support for the project and were convinced to allow the variances. Persuasive points from the UUCK group (Randy Leeson, Rev. Melissa, Matt Slater, and architect Doug Fuller) included mentioning the historic nature of our congregation and building, the careful and thorough planning for the project. the attention to being visually compatible with the historic church building, and the nature of our site. All three variances were granted.

The Tuesday meeting with the Planning Commission went equally well. Again, Doug Fuller, Rev. Melissa, and Randy Leeson made brief presentations as to the nature of the project and the congregation's commitment to stay in the historic West Side neighborhood. Planning Board members raised relevant points about driving patterns, green areas, storm water disposal, and number of windows in

the building. After discussion, most questions were answered and the Board voted to approve the plans with one or two contingencies. One of these unresolved areas deals with parking, but is soon to be resolved. Our architect Doug Fuller is continuing to meet with fire department officials to resolve questions concerning fire protection.

It is laudable to note that Planning Commission members cited several aspects of our plans. They were impressed with the attention to detail in the planning of our green spaces and the design for a play area for children. They also cited our Hogwarts program as great community outreach.

As for the ground breaking for our new building, the date has not been set...but stay tuned. Also, you may want to give a big UU hug to the members of our Building Extension Team: Lois Weir and Matt Slater, co-chairs, Randy Leeson, project manager, Mary Lou Holly, and Larry Johnson.

FYI:

- Over 90 members have volunteered for our new Social Hour Teams. Thank you for your willingness to serve our congregation.
- At the District Assembly in Akron, delegates voted to dissolve the Ohio Meadville District. Services and events will be continued through CERG, our new regional association. We will also be working more closely with our cluster congregations: Wooster, Akron, Canton, and Youngstown.
- Informational Meeting for the Annual Meeting: Tuesday, May 31st. In the Sanctuary at 7pm.
- Annual Meeting, After 2nd service on June 5th.

After four harrowing years on the Western Front, Tom Sherbourne returns to Australia and takes a job as the lighthouse keeper on Janus Rock, nearly half a day's journey from the coast. To this isolated island, where the supply boat comes once a season, Tom brings a young, bold, and loving wife, Isabel.

Years later, after two miscarriages and one stillbirth, the grieving Isabel hears a baby's cries on the wind. A boat has washed up onshore carrying a dead man and a living baby. Tom, who keeps meticulous records and whose moral principles have withstood a horrific war, wants to report the man and infant immediately. But Isabel insists the baby is a "gift from God," and against Tom's judgment, they claim her as their own and name her Lucy. When she is two, Tom and Isabel return to the mainland and are reminded that there are other people in the world. Their choice has devastated one of them.


